If you were out in the drizzle on October 8 at Shepley, you might have seen an interesting exercise in action. Dog rescue and recovery trainers from Mark9, a charitable, non-profit, volunteer search and

rescue unit dedicated to the training of search and rescue dogs, will periodically use this property for training. They could have up to 10 dogs and handlers there during a session. They will always post a sign indicating they are on the trails at each entrance. And the dogs are highly skilled, and will not present any problem if you happen upon them. Rarely one will see a tree that has develop a big bumpy growth.

These are called burls and caused by an injury that hyper stimulates the cambial growth of the tree. The burls are covered by bark. Generally the tree continues to be healthy and grows for many years with this anomaly. These burls are highly prized by wood sculptures for have a

beautiful, interesting and unique grain. As mentioned before Harlan is among some big white pines. One of these white pines has a very distinctive burl. If you would like to see a burled tree one can find one off the main town forest road between the pump house and the well site. Every burl is unique just like Harlan our elusive gnome.
