#### Surrenden Farm Hike June 14

Sunday, June 14 at 1PM sharp. Join members of the Groton Trails Committee and the Appalachian

Mountain Club on a guided hike. We'll start by hiking the open field habitat of Surrenden Farms, a wonderful conservation area. Then we'll continue into the adjacent Sabine Memorial Woods conservation area, hiking through upland woods, by wetland areas, and along the banks of the scenic Nashua River. Our hike will take about two hours and is suitable for families with children. Dogs must be well behaved and leashed upon request. Wear comfortable hiking shoes. The hike will be held unless it is very stormy. From Rt. 119 in Groton center, take Pleasant St. (Rt. 111) southward, continue south on Farmers Row, then right turn onto Joy Lane, then left turn onto Shirley Rd. Proceed 0.2 miles to the first bend and take a right. Proceed another 0.2 miles to the second bend, where Shirley Rd. turns to gravel. Park there at the trailhead kiosk on Shirley Rd. 42.5866N, 71.5947W. Olin Lathrop olin@embedinc.com (978) 742-9014.



### Gamlin Crystal Spring Walk June 21

Sunday, June 21 at 1PM sharp, join members of the Groton Trails Committee on a guided hike on the Indian Rock Trail and the Boulders Trail of the Gamlin Crystal Spring Conservation Area in Groton. This beautiful conservation area, owned by the Groton Conservation Trust, is accessed via skillfully routed trails and features dense woods, rocky outcrops, a porcupine den, beaver ponds, huge boulders, and an old "lost" quarry. The hike will take about 2 hours and is suitable for families with children. Dogs must be under owner's control and leashed if requested. Wear comfortable hiking shoes as there are some short rocky sections. The hike will be held unless it is very stormy. We will meet at the trail head on Old Dunstable Rd. Take Lowell Rd. (Rt. 40) to Old Dunstable Rd. Proceed north on Old Dunstable Rd., passing the intersection with Bridge St. after 1.25 miles, then continuing on Old Dunstable Rd. for another 0.25 miles. The trail head and parking are on your left, just past the sign for the Gamlin Conservation Area. 42.631084N, -71.510190W. Dave Minott, DMinott@charter.net.
