i-Naturalist challenges

We are creating new challenges to use the i-Naturalist app and to document the nature of Groton. Two upcoming event include a **predator challenge** and a **moth night**. Stayed tuned for dates and details.

Not sure how to use iNaturalist?

Here are some <u>video</u> <u>tutorials</u> that can help you Harlan still is hiding waiting to be found. With all the rain, his mossy rocks are a lush green. Along the trail Indian pipe (Monotropa uniflora) is sprouting up everywhere pushing the decaying leaves aside.

It is a translucent white and two to twelve inches tall. The one flower hangs head down but as the fruit develops the stem straightens. Usually they grow in clumps of three or more plants.

This plant has no green leaves but gets its nourishment and growth upon organic matter that has built up from other plants in the soil or forest litter. So if there are Indian pipes along the trail you are hiking Harlan may be near.

Survey says...

Thank you to everyone who completed our survey and congratulations to **Matt Miller**, winner of the gift card to Gibbet Hill.

Some findings this year include:

- Top properties visited: General Field (58%), Sabine Woods(44%), Gamlin (40%)
- Marked trails(46%) and trail maps(34%) are the top enhancements
- There is overall support of current balance of conservation versus recreation
- 50% of respondents are 11+ year residents of Groton, and 60% are over 55
